



INCOME AND EXPENDITURE




Aggregated income (in EUR x 1,000) Solidaridad Network 2011-2021

A FEW EXAMPLES OF OUR WORK

In Ethiopia, we worked with factory managers and workers to sensitize 45,065 factory workers on occupational health and safety, resulting in improved working conditions.



2.000 coffee farmers in Colombia and Peru were registered in Rabobank's Acorn platform to receive carbon sales for planting forests within their farms. This enables them to directly benefit from the carbon market.





We trained over 8,000 cocoa farmers in good agricultural practices, improved farm management and diversification to enhance productivity. Through the Cocoa Life programme, we empowered women to take proactive roles in leadership.



In all Solidaridad programmes, data driven solutions that provide added value to farmers and the businesses they work with are effectively developed and implemented. This way, we managed to reach 1.2 million small producers and workers with our solutions.



Through a collaborative citizen campaign we offered 40,000 signatures to the Dutch government, demanding to put in place legislation requiring companies to respect human rights and the environment in their value chains.



Over 75,000 smallholder soy farmers recorded 250,000 metric tons produced under better management practices. We also provided access to certified seeds, inoculants and soil tests, leading to a 65% change and improvement in yield and/or productivity.



In Kenya and Tanzania 56 coffee demonstration plots were established to enhance knowledge transfer. In Kenya and Uganda, farmers increased productivity from an average of 2 to 3.4 kilos of cherry yield



We launched the Transamazonica Platform to work on environmental regulation, financial mechanisms and forest restoration in the Amazon. The Public Credit Guide for Cocoa helps farmers to get credit for their improved production systems.

More than 12,000 women dairy farmers in Bangladesh were empowered with digital technologies to have better control on revenue earned.



Through the Trinitea programme 41,400 hectares were brought under climate management practices. 105,000 tea farm workers improved their working conditions, over 60 percent are women (temporary) farmworkers.



15 artisanal and small-scale mines improved their working conditions after we trained them to operate responsibly in line with the CRAFT Code. Key elements of the Code have now also been incorporated into a



In Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua, the national interpretations of the RSPO principles and criteria were approved. We managed to get several smallholder organizations formalized and to get the sector's zero deforestation agreement officially ratified in Honduras.
